Formerly the national library sales manager for Kapco, Kary authored a basic book repair guide previously available from Kapco and has presented book protection/repair workshops in various venues throughout the U.S. Workshop Description: This workshop is designed to demonstrate quick and easy techniques for extending shelf life on general circulating materials. Prevention is the key, but we will be addressing specific, common repairs: re-inserting loose pages, broken spines, torn header caps, ripped and torn pages. Maker Team

The seven maker programming kits for MMLL members to use are: *Squishy Circuits; *Ozobots; *Q-BA-Maze; *Photography Studio; *Virtual Field Trip; and *Sewing! We will also have two MakerBot 3D printers that will circulate with laptops with associated software for use, and one will also include a 3D scanner attached to an iPad with associated application. The MMLL “maker team” (Tracy Logan-Walker, Cadillac; Sarah Maddox, Houghton Lake; Michelle Moore, Missaukee; Stacy Pasche, Benzie Shores) is finalizing kit compilation with associated instructions and resources. Stay tuned for the announcement of availability. The University of Michigan received funding from the IMLS to bring maker education to all areas of Michigan. A project coming out of the M.I.T. Media Lab seeks to ease the challenge of finding government data and to make it available to a wider audience. The project, called [Data USA](#), bills itself as “the most comprehensive visualization of U.S. public data.” It is free, and its software code is open source, meaning that developers can build custom applications by adding other data.
